An extraordinary volunteer and respected leader



ANDREW Publisher IN AUGUST OF THIS YEAR, the Pacific Northwest lost one of its giants in the golf community, William H. "Bill" Mays, a longstanding and extraordinary volunteer of the Pacific Northwest Golf Association, Washington State Golf Association, Pacific Coast Golf Association, United States

Golf Association, and The Home Course in DuPont, Washington.

Since 1979, Bill made selfless contributions that have resulted in the Associations achieving a level of excellence and respect within the golf community that would otherwise not have been possible.

Bill served as a volunteer club representative to the PNGA and WSGA for over 30 years, first as a member of Yakima (Wash.) Country Club, and then later as a member of Canterwood Golf and Country Club in Gig Harbor, Wash. During this time he served in practically every volunteer capacity each Association affords. Whether it was volunteering his legal expertise to rewrite the Association by-laws or serving as a volunteer chairman for PNGA and WSGA championships at his own club, Bill gave very generously of his time.

Bill served on the PNGA Board of Directors from 1982-1995, and then again from 2007-2012. He chaired or served on almost every committee, was Treasurer, and served as President from 1989-1990. When he stepped down from the PNGA Board in 1995, he still remained very active in a non-voting capacity on the Board as Legal Counsel, until fully retiring from legal practice in 2007. He rejoined the PNGA Board in 2007 because of his role as President of The Home Course Board of Directors.

In 1992, when the PNGA and WSGA cooperatively reorganized the structure and services for each Association, Bill played a leading role. He took on the monumental task of re-writing the by-laws of each Association, which charted the path of success for both organizations.

He served on the WSGA Board of Directors since 1992 and became President from 2001-2003. Since 1992 he also served as Legal Counsel on the WSGA Board of Directors until retiring from legal practice in 2007. In 1999 Bill was awarded the PNGA Distinguished Service Award, the PNGA's highest honor in recognition for volunteers who have donated their time and effort simply for the betterment of the game.


Bill's longstanding dream for over 20 years was for the PNGA and WSGA to one day cooperatively acquire, own, and operate a golf course that would serve as the home for Northwest Golf House, future permanent offices for the PNGA, WSGA and Allied Associations. In 2007, Bill's dream became a realization for the PNGA and WSGA. His remarkable leadership led to the purchasing of a golf course in DuPont, Wash., which you all know as The Home Course.

Bill became the foundation of The Home Course and was elected President of the Board of Directors. His leadership led the course to be chosen by the USGA as the Assisting Course with Chambers Bay in hosting the 2010 U.S. Amateur Championship.

In the five years that Bill devoted himself to The Home Course, he emphasized and led the mission that it should be a place "all that is good for the game of golf," a place that provides the stewardship that was promised to the PNGA and WSGA members. Since 2007 it has complimentarily hosted over 12 PNGA, WSGA, USGA, and Washington Junior Golf Association championships and qualifiers. It was selected as the host site for the 2014 U.S. Women's Amateur Public Links Championship, became a turf-grass research site for environmental stewardship, formed active junior golf camps held throughout the summer, created the "Little Home Course" for junior golfers and beginners, annually promotes PGA and USGA "grow the game" initiatives, and started a \$5 standby green fee program for juniors. And that is just the beginning.

These volunteer contributions pertaining to Bill cover only a small portion of all he has done for golf in the Pacific Northwest. Most of Bill's contributions were done behind the scenes in a manner that earned him no fanfare, which is the way he wanted it to be. Everyone who knew Bill can confirm his reputation for honesty and integrity.

On a personal note, in 2011 Bill took me under his wing and mentored me in my new role as Executive Director and CEO. I will be forever grateful for his support, wisdom, and friendship. He has impacted many lives, and his legacy will live on forever.

SWILCAN PROPOSITION

There is a lot of history about the Swilcan Bridge on the 18th hole at the Old Course in St. Andrews. And for Sara Berlin and Chris Griffin, the history became a little more personal when Griffin proposed to her on it while playing the course during their trip to Scotland this past May.

The two initially met in 2005 while working in the pro shop at Tacoma Country & Golf Club. They went their separate ways, Berlin working as head coach of the University of San Francisco women's golf team, and Griffin heading to the Southwest to pursue his PGA Tour dream. Sara returned to Tacoma, now working as a PGA professional at the club; and Griffin still plays, but now with the Northwest as his base. The two began dating in 2008.

They were married on October 11 on the green of Tacoma's par-3 15th hole. "We chose that date (10/11/12) so he wouldn't ever forget," said Sara with a laugh.

And the honeymoon? Someplace just as memorable as the proposal: "We're going to Augusta to watch the Masters."

PLATH INDUCTED INTO BLIND HOF

In August at a ceremony following the U.S. Blind Golf Association (USBGA) National Championship at Middle Bay CC on Long Island, N.Y., Ron Plath of Lake Oswego, Ore. was inducted into the Blind Golf Hall of Fame.

"When I first started losing my sight it was always my hope to keep playing but I wasn't sure if it was possible," said Plath. "When I saw that completely blind people were competing, it was comforting to know that this was something I could do forever."

Plath was diagnosed with macular degeneration when he was 26 years old and is legally blind. As his sight slowly deteriorated over the years to the point where he had to give up driving and his job as an educator in the Beaverton School District, his golf game didn't miss a beat. He joined the USBGA in 2003, winning the B-3 national championship five times and the International Blind Golf Association World Championships in 2008. Plath helped secure, promote and organize USBGA National Championship tournaments in Oregon in 2003 and 2006. He served as USBGA junior golf chairman from 2008-2009. In 2006, he formed the Northwest Blind Golf Foundation, an organization that conducts weekly golf clinics for junior and adult golfers in Oregon and Washington. He also serves as the USBGA representative on the IBGA board. The Oregon native still has the 7-iron that his father cut down for him when he was 3-uears old.

Plath was unable to attend the ceremony in August, having hurt his back (if it's not one thing, it's another) the month before during the World Blind Golf Championship in Nova Scotia. So he will be officially honoured at the Blind Golf Open Championship in 2013, which will be held at Stone Creek GC in Oregon City, south of Portland.




GOLF IS A FUNNY GAME Daran Dauble; \$10 Northwest Links Press

This collection of essays and golf instruction, written by PGA professional Daran Dauble, was collected and edited by his brother, Dennis Dauble. After a battle with cancer, Daran passed away this past March after spending 34 years at Glendoveer GC in Portland, first as director of instruction, then head golf professional, and since 1992 as Director of Golf.

The subtitle of the book is "A Club Professional's Tales of Teaching and Travel," and the collection is clearly a love song sent to the golf industry. Daran spent most of his working life helping others enjoy the game, and his efforts included founding the Glendoveer Junior Program, which has become on the largest in Oregon; serving as head coach of the Multnomah County Special Olympics golf team for 21 years; and being a certified club-fitter for 25 years. In 1991, Dauble was named Teacher of the Year by his fellow PGA professionals.

BACKSPIN: 120 YEARS OF GOLF IN BRITISH COLUMBIA Arv Olson; \$28.95 Heritage House Publishing

Twenty years ago, Arv Olson, who for 38 years was the voice of golf as a columnist for the Vancouver (B.C.) Sun newspaper, compiled and published an account of the game as it had been played for a century throughout the province. Now, in "Backspin: 120 Years of Golf in British Columbia," published by B.C.'s Heritage House Publishing, we find an expanded, restructured edition that includes loads of new information and photographs. This ambitious undertaking starts in the 1890s on the shores of Jericho Beach in Vancouver and in Beacon Hill Park in Victoria. and ends with the final thrilling holes played in the Victoria Open last year. The author has traveled the province, building a wide offering of anecdotal history from the Kootenays to Haida Gwaii, Victoria to Port Alice and across the Lower Mainland.

This incredibly rich book chronicles all the personalities that have walked the province's fairways, and covers tournament golf and exhibition events and introduces some of the international visitors from Bobby Jones and Walter Hagen to Britain's Joyce Wethered.

The book includes a foreword written by Ward Stouffer, PGA of BC Director of Golf at Fairwinds G&CC on Vancouver Island, who first met Olson during tournament play around Vancouver in the 1970s.

Lepp's Big Break

James Lepp, the Abbotsford, B.C. native who won the NCAA Individual Championship while playing for the University of Washington as a four-time All-American, is a member of the cast of "Big Break Greenbrier," which is airing on the Golf Channel. Lepp was the 2003 PNGA Co-Player of the Year (along with Brock Mackenzie) and the '05 PNGA Player of the Year, and he appeared on the cover (with Mackenzie) of the March 2004 issue of this magazine.

The 28-year old Lepp, who still plays out of his childhood course of Ledgeview G&CC in Abbotsford. was the medalist at the 2005 U.S. Amateur, then had some success on the Canadian Tour after turning pro in 2006. But, by his own admission, he burned out on the game after a few years.

"I wanted to be a professional golfer since I was four years old, ever since I picked up a golf club," said Lepp. "I love golf, and live for golf. It's all I really know. I always was competing at the highest level, through junior golf, amateur golf and college golf. A couple of years into playing professionally I hit a pretty solid wall. I failed to improve. I felt like I was getting worse. Happily, I turned away from the game. I needed it. I was starting to 'hate' golf, and I never thought I would get to that point. After a few years of barely playing and working on the business side of golf, I'm really starting to enjoy the game again. I'm curious to find out what 'real' competition feels like after being away."

At 75 years old, Sander was the oldest competitor in the championship proper by almost 30 years - way to go, Anne! The championship was held Oct. 6-11 at Briggs Ranch GC in San Antonio, Texas. In her career, Sander has won seven USGA national championships, behind only Bobby Jones and Tiger Woods (with nine) and PNGA Hall of Famer JoAnne Carner and Jack Nicklaus (with eight) in number of championships won.

Pretty good company.

We knew him when

The World Golf Hall of Fame & Museum will enshrine Seattle native Fred Couples as the first member of the Class of 2013. Couples



will be inducted into the Hall of Fame at its Induction Ceremony on Monday, May 6, 2013, at World Golf Village in St. Augustine, Fla. The ceremony will once again kick off The Players Championship week. It will be fitting for Couples, who won the 1984 and 1996 Players Championships.

Yes, he's had an okay career as a professional, but we of course remember him for his amateur career here in the Northwest, which is legendary. He won the 1976 PNGA Junior Amateur (see photo), the 1977 Washington Junior Golf Association championship, the 1978 Washington State Amateur, the 1978 Washington Open, the 1978 BC Junior Boys' Amateur, the 1979 BC Amateur, was the Low Amateur at the 1979 U.S. Open and Medalist at the 1980 U.S. Amateur, and won the 1988 and '90 Northwest Opens. In 1999 he received the PNGA Centennial Lifetime Achievement Award.

On November 1, the Southern Nevada Golf Association did the same thing. In 2010, six Southern California golf associations also began using GHIN as their provider.

What does all this mean? Well, it means that, since you are receiving this magazine, you carry a handicap through the USGA's GHIN Network, and this means that when you leave the cold and wet Northwest winter to get some sun and play a little golf in the warm weather of the Southwest, you can most likely post your scores right at the club without having to change out of your Bermuda shorts and sunscreen. Using your same GHIN number. All under one umbrella.



Self-taught **Dan Hixson** has quietly become one of the region's best course designers BY BLAINE NEWNHAM

DAN HIXSON, PERHAPS THE MOST CELEBRATED NEW GOLF ARCHITECT IN THE COUNTRY, is supremely self-taught. Not only didn't he study as a golf architect, but never worked for one either.

After just two full-fledged course designs – Bandon Crossings on the Southern Oregon coast, and Wine Valley Golf Club in Walla Walla, Wash. – Hixson is not only a nationally-recognized designer, but may well be an heir to great Northwest designers, following in the footsteps of A.V. Macan, Chandler Egan, Bunny Mason, John Fought, Bill Robinson, Bill Overdorf, John Steidel and John Harbottle.

Sculpted in the waving wheat country of Southeast Washington, Wine Valley, which opened in 2009, has recently been included in a top 100 list of America's best modern designs, ahead of courses like Hazeltine and Valhalla, former sites of major championships.

Hixson is presently working on a 27-hole course in Eastern Oregon called Silvies Valley Ranch near the town of John Day. Indeed, he's building a course when only 10 new golf course projects are underway in the entire U.S.

So who is Dan Hixson, and how did he get there?

"When I was a kid my mom said she'd see

the light on in my room late at night and she was sure I was drawing golf holes," he said.

The dream never forgot Hixson. He followed in his dad's footsteps – Harvey was a PGA club pro in Cottage Grove, Ore. – working for 12 years at Columbia Edgewater in Portland, eventually becoming that club's PGA head pro. He was good enough as a player to do a minitour stint in Australia and New Zealand.

But there remained this burning desire to design courses. He said the dream first sparked in the late 1960s when his dad took him to watch Robert Trent Jones' remaking of nearby Eugene Country Club, where his grandparents were members.

Dan Hixson was seven.

"The art side was always there," he said. "I was constantly drawing. I designed furniture. I kept track of the great golf holes I had seen. I was particularly taken by the Alister MacKenzie work in Australia. I liked the natural look of the bunkers."

His schooling for course design came during the failed attempt to play golf for a living, but also during his successful tenure as a teaching pro. He understood the average golfer, and, more than anything, he understood golf as a business.

He knew courses built in the 1980s and '90s moved too much dirt, cost too much to build

and maintain, and were, in some instances, destined to fail.

"I wasn't afraid," he said, "to tell clients they couldn't spend \$8 million and have the project be successful."

But how do you get started as an architect when you've never even worked with one?

For Hixson, it came one hole at a time. He built a short-game practice area and par-3 course at Columbia Edgewater. He built greens here and tees there. He helped with a remodel at Emerald Valley near Eugene, and did a smart nine-hole revision at the Crestview course in Waldport, Ore.

For Hixson, the move to a career in design was as much personal as it was professional. He left Columbia Edgewater, got divorced, downscaled and began a career devoted to being an architect even if he weren't one.

He sought the advice of other architects. Harbottle told him to find people who wanted to build a golf course, and build it for them.

"I would have done Bandon Crossings for nothing," he said.

Indeed, it was the gamble a couple from Eugene – Rex and Carla Smith – took on Hixson to build Bandon Crossings that realized the dream.

WORD OF MOUTH After Dan Hixson designed the par-3

course at Portland's Columbia Edgewater Country Club, more or less in his spare time while he was still the club's head professional, the word started to spread that here was someone who understood the game from the inside, understood what club pros and general managers would need and want. And he began to land small jobs at the region's clubs, performing small renovation projects on a few holes here and there. Twice he was selected to upgrade some of the layout at Seattle's Rainier Golf and Country Club, most recently just finishing a complete overhaul of the club's ninth green, which had earned notoriety over the years for the number of 4-putts it planted on golfers' scorecards.

"The selection of Dan for Rainier projects was based on Dan's background in local golf and love for course design," said Bryon Hammock, CCM, the General Manager at Rainier. "After he designed our first-class short game area, we knew he was the right pick to redesign one of Rainier's most challenging holes and our practice green."

Hixson reshaped and re-sloped the green to USGA standards, and arranged for the staff at Rainier to save over 9,700 linear feet of sod, which was re-used once Hixson was ready for it. He also enlarged the nearby practice putting green to nearly double its original size.

The club is planning to have the new hole open for play by April 1, 2013. Named the #1 Resort in America by both Golf Magazine and Golf Digest, **Bandon Dunes Golf Resort** offers four courses ranked in the Top 15 You Can Play by Golf Magazine. Our newest course, Bandon Preserve, offers stunning views of the Pacific Ocean from every hole. 

Eye of Any Hurricane

The irrepressible Shawna lanson BY JENNIFER SWINDELL

ONE OF THE BEST AMATEUR GOLFERS IN IDAHO didn't take up the game until she was 39. Now, 20 years later, Shawna lanson regularly plays in championships' final groups in final rounds where the combined ages of her playing partners is usually less than her own age.

lanson is a retired teacher, former college athlete and cancer survivor. She's also a shining example of how, at any age and under most any physical circumstances, you can be a successful amateur golfer.

"I recently realized how successful I have been because of the game of golf – not just because of my winning tournaments, but also what I have gained in friendships, companionship, traveling,

and my personal life," lanson said. "It literally has changed my life."

lanson has been a lifelong competitive athlete who enjoyed softball, basketball and volleyball when she was young. She is an excellent bowler and was a member of the Boise State University bowling team, and remains a huge fan of Bronco sports ("I was a Bronco before being a Bronco was cool."). She considered becoming a professional bowler but opted instead to be a teacher.

By the age of 39, she was interested in starting a new sport, one less demanding on her body.

"When I took up golf, I really took it up," said lanson. "I joined several leagues and hit balls as often as I could. I took lessons and played in every tournament I could find."

Today she is at the top of her game. No other golfer (male or female) played in all 10 of the Idaho Golf Association's main events over the last two years – Four-Ball, State Amateur, Mid-Amateur, Senior Amateur and Tournament of Champions. She usually finishes in the top 10.

"The IGA championships are run so professionally that I feel that I am close to really playing on a professional tour, even though it's just an amateur event," she said. "I like trying to beat the young girls. I feel that I can be competitive no matter how much older I am than they are."

She won this year's IGA Women's Mid-Amateur in a one-hole playoff and is the two-time defending champion in the IGA's four-ball event. She has won multiple club championships and is a regular on Idaho's PNGA Cup team.

"When Shawna competes, she isn't flashy or overpowering, just a solid citizen who brings a soft-spoken, competitive spirit," said IGA executive director Genger Fahleson.

Winning trophies has not been her only reward. The golf course is where she met the love of her life, Bob lanson. They are members at Hillcrest Country Club in Boise, and since her retirement from teaching, Shawna can play and practice as much as she wants.

"By playing a difficult course almost every day and really working on my game, my handicap dropped rather quickly," said Shawna, who maintains a 3-handicap. "I love golf because improvement is a moving target. Once you break 90, then you want to break 80, then 70. But I also love to be out in the fresh air and green grass. The scenery of a golf course has so much beauty, and nature is all around you."

Shawna most likes competing in individual events, though she enjoys partner tournaments, including chapmans with her husband, who is also a very good player, carrying a single-digit handicap. They won the Chapman Championship at Lakeview Golf Course in Meridian, Idaho this year.

Her greatest accomplishment in golf was qualifying for the 2008 USGA Senior Women's Amateur, held that year in Tulsa, Okla.

Shawna had her best season ever in 2012, even though she was diagnosed with thyroid cancer only 18 months ago. It was shocking to receive the diagnosis because she was always healthy and reliable, but she took on the news with strength and courage.

"Cancer never changed her attitude about golf," said Amber Van Ocker, a friend and fellow competitor. "I've never seen her rattled. The second you count Shawna out (in a tournament), is the second you've lost." Most of her friends didn't even know she was sick, because she never skipped a beat. She didn't slow down practicing and playing golf. Most of her competitors didn't even know she had cancer. She continued to golf almost every day, and has added tennis to her repertoire. And she doesn't really talk about it because she doesn't think of it as much of a problem.

She had surgery to remove her thyroid and will be on medication the rest of her life. Her husband was diagnosed with prostate cancer this year and also underwent surgery.

"They told me that my metabolism would be down and that I might gain weight and feel tired, but I have not noticed," she said. "We're both doing well and are optimistic that we will both be fine."

We all are.

Water, Water, Everywhere

When marking a golf course for play, don't paint yourself into a corner, or a hazard

ONE OF THE MOST IMPORTANT TASKS in creating a venue that abides by the Rules of Golf is the proper marking of the course. This includes ensuring the boundaries of the course are well



identified; marking of water and lateral water hazards; identifying abnormal ground conditions; obstructions and integral parts of the course.

At British Columbia Golf, we use lines to mark the margins of water and lateral water hazards. In such an instance, any stake used identifies the water hazard; the painted lines define the margin. Remember, margins of water or lateral water hazards go up and down. A ball is deemed to be in a water hazard when any part of it touches the

water hazard. In the accompanying photo, with the ball touching the red line, it is in the water hazard.

Stakes and lines should be placed to include in the hazard not only the water, but also rough, banks and unkempt growth related directly to the hazard. Again looking at the photo, this line has been painted in accordance with outside the unkempt growth, etc. However, there is one small problem with where this line is painted, which will become apparent.

In the photo, the ball lies on a sprinkler head (an immovable obstruction), however, the ball lies in or touches the water hazard. How may this player proceed? The player may play the ball as it lies, being careful not to ground his club, or he may proceed under any of the options provided by Rule 26-1, with a penalty of one stroke.

Even though the player's ball lies on an immovable obstruction, he is not entitled to free relief as his ball lies in a water hazard (Note 1 to Rule 24-1). If the ball lay closer to the center of the sprinkler head – not touching the hazard line – it would not be in the hazard, and he would be entitled to free relief.

Where should this line be painted? Far enough away from the sprinkler head to ensure if a ball comes to rest on or near it, the ball will not be in the hazard.

In this situation, the player chose to play the ball as it lay – which could have damaged the club head and the sprinkler head. This may make for both an unhappy player and an unhappy superintendent.

If you are involved in the marking of your course, please pay careful attention to where lines are placed. And if you need any guidance, a

good document to have on hand is the USGA's publication, "How to Conduct a Competition." This publication is full of good guidelines that should be used even when marking your course for your regular day-to-day play.

Rules large...

On the 34th (and, as it would turn out, final) hole in the championship match of the 2012 PNGA Junior Boys' Amateur, held this past summer at Port Ludlow (Wash.) Golf Club, there is a small creek that runs across the fairway of the par-4 just about where a big drive might land. Lucas Gatto of Burnaby, B.C. – down three holes with three to play to Kevin Vigna of Coquitlam, B.C. – walked down the fairway to find that his tee shot had come to rest among a few small rocks inside the lateral hazard line of the creek.

And Gatto knew what this meant.

He knew he needed to win the hole to stay alive and extend the match. With Vigna's tee shot safely in the middle of the fairway, Gatto knew that if he incurred the one-stroke penalty and took a drop, the match would pretty much be over.

So he thought about his options. If he played the ball as it lies, where would he stand – in the creek? on the rocks? Could he even get the club on the ball, which had settled next to some rocks next to the water's edge? Gatto asked the referee of the match, Port Ludlow's Director of Golf, Vito DeSantis, if he could remove the loose impediments from the hazard where his ball lay – and DeSantis informed him he could not (under the Note to Rule 23–1). If he took a drop, where would he drop? And if he did take a drop, took the penalty, he would still need to make a difficult shot from a difficult lie.

Gatto and Vigna are friends, playing junior golf together at the same club, Vancouver (B.C.) Golf Club. They played on the same high school golf team in Burnaby, B.C. And Gatto had only entered this championship because he heard his friend had entered.

And now it came to this. And there really wasn't any alternative. Gatto took the drop. Took the penalty. Accepted it for what it was. And when they had both reached the green, Gatto conceded the hole and the match to his friend. And they embraced.

At the Par-3 Greenlake GC in Seattle, Wash., Local Rule No. 2-b states, "After seven strokes, player may move on to the next hole." Around these parts, we call this the "Anti-Snowman Rule."

WE ASKED, YOU ANSWERED. Q&A FROM THE BEST OF THEM

Monkey business, crow's shenanigans, Timberlake's malfunction, beer in a bag, and the looming controversy about belly putters. No, we don't shy from talking about it

HOW DID YOU GET STARTED IN THE GAME?

BRYSON My dad influenced me to get started at a young age, like most kids, but I didn't fall in love with the game until the early "Tiger" era.

BRYSON Working as a golf professional at a public golf course, I've had my share of strange encounters. My favorite would be the nude sunbathers across the river from our course

HALL Besides my own golf swing? Really, the strangest thing I know of I didn't see with my own eyes. I only reported on it. It came at Crooked River Ranch last year when a pair of ladies playing together aced the same hole. The chances of that are astronomical enough - about 17 million to one. But two months later on the very same course two men,

who knew the ladies well, did the exact same thing.

MARRINGTON While in Malaysia, I saw two monkeys making love and looking at me like I am the distraction. At the same course, ordering a beer, no plastic cups, I was given a lunch baggie with a twist tie and straw - beer in a bag!

MEEHAN A playing partner, who shall remain nameless, once hit a ball with such a descending blow that it went into its own divot, popped out backwards and then rolled forward 5 yards because it had so much spin. Same guy once one-putted for a nine on a 125yard par-3.

IT SHOULD BE LEGAL IN GOLF TO....

BRYSON Have unlimited specifications for equipment (clubs/balls etc.) from the USGA. I believe golf needs a boost. If the game was easier and more fun, more new players would stick with it. I compare the golf industry with the skiing industry, when snowboards were invented the ski industry received a shot in the arm. Golf needs a snowboard!

HALL Play the out-of-bounds as a lateral hazard. Think of how much time that would save for those of us who hit more tee shots during the course of a round than a long-drive champion's practice session.

MARRINGTON Bring firearms to shoot the crows and ravens that hijack your food from your cart. Will never

forget my first game at Nicklaus North in Whistler, B.C. Purchased a very large sandwich, took one small bite, walked over to the green to make my putt, and the bugger had destroyed my sandwich the moment I turned my back. DOH!

MEEHAN Take one 4-foot putt on each nine. Maybe two.

IT SHOULD BE ILLEGAL IN GOLF TO....

BRYSON Anchor a golf club to the body.

HALL Stare down a putting line for more than one minute if you have a double-digit handicap. I understand why a PGA Tour pro wants to see every facet of the putt. But I've seen way too many hacks like myself analyze a green like an accountant analyzes a tax form on the way to a three-putt.





MARRINGTON Have in excess of two groups on the tee box of a par-3 waiting for the group ahead. Slow play for sure!

MEEHAN Suffer through 5-hour rounds. Ready golf should be a requirement.

BRYSON Bill Murray and my twin daughters, Kalynn and Kenna.

A Look at the Past, a Goal for the Future

THE IDAHO GOLF ASSOCIATION'S total membership in 2012 with 17,200 regular members and 690 junior members was nearly identical to the active golfer membership of 2011. A goal for 2013 is to create growth in those membership numbers.

The IGA had a successful 2012 Championship season. The Association conducted 12 state championships, four USGA qualifiers, two junior event qualifiers (Big I and Junior World) and the Carter Cup Matches, which is a Ryder Cup-style competition between Idaho amateurs and the professionals of the Rocky Mountain Section PGA, Snake River Chapter. The IGA Junior Tour included approximately 40, 1-day and 2-day competitions throughout the four districts in Idaho. Overall entry numbers in IGA Championships have held fairly steady compared to 2011. In 2011, 936 Idaho golfers entered IGA Championships, and 909 golfers entered IGA Championships in 2012.

A big challenge for the IGA and BanBury Golf Course was serving as host for the Junior America's Cup which was held in July. The Junior America's Cup is a competition featuring an elite field of 17 teams representing state and regional golf organizations in the western United States that select the best junior golfers in their area to participate.

The 2013 IGA Spring Meeting schedule will be released in January, 2013. Each year the IGA conducts three Spring Meetings, one in each of the three districts. The main business conducted at the Spring Meetings is an election of one Board member in each district. We will be actively searching out potential Board members over the next couple of months. Golf is a Great Walk, Spoil Yourself

A LITTLE RESEARCH CONFIRMED that it was not likely that Mark Twain, the great American author and humorist, ever penned the quote "Golf is a good walk spoiled," but current research would indicate that the sentiment is a little misguided. In fact the research

now says that golf is a low impact activity that meets the average adult's daily need to take 10,000 steps. Walking 18 holes and carrying clubs can burn up to 2,000 calories and experts now say that walking 18 holes is

equivalent to a six-kilometer run. No wonder golfers on average have a five-year longer life expectancy than the general population.

Now, there will always be those distractors who claim that, while the above stats might be true, there are too many golfers who ride in a golf cart and they get little or no benefit from the sport. While my evidence is not scientific, the technology available to me would indicate that these sentiments are misguided as well.

Steve Jobs invented a really neat little device called the iPod Nano and I have been wearing it for the last while and using the builtin pedometer to record how many steps I take daily. The results over the summer have been very interesting.

On days when I just go to work and come back home I will average between 4,000-6,000 steps. (Yes, it counts when you get up from your desk and walk down the hall to talk to a colleague rather than send an email.) If I add 18 holes during the day or after work my step count varies from 18,000-22,000 steps, depending on how straight I hit the ball that day.

On a typical weekend playing with my friends, my step count averaged about 15,000. Weekends in my mind are for playing golf and

having a sleep to catch up and get ready for the next week. (That's what I tell my family and I am sticking to it.)

The really interesting part of my research is what my step count was when circumstances dictated I take a cart. I do have a strong preference for walking but there are courses that are a difficult walk or for some other reason a golf cart is used. In those circumstances my step count would vary between 10,000-13,000 steps.

The reality is that even when one uses a cart there are a lot of steps to take between where you park and the green, in stalking the break of a putt from all directions and in walking disgustedly down the fairway after a cold top.

So let's all agree that "Golf is a great walk, so spoil yourself," and you can quote me on that. Looking forward to see you all walking and swinging into 2013.

Gerry also held the Player Development Trust Fund near and dear to his heart, supporting the cause with an unwavering level of enthusiasm, dedication and financial generosity.

In 2009, Gerry was the Manager for the Canada Summer Games team sent by British Columbia to Prince Edward Island. Under his mentoring, British Columbia captured four gold medals, one silver and one bronze. Gerry has also served as a non-playing captain for teams representing British Columbia at national events on many occasions.

More recently, he acted as the Chair of the British Columbia Golf Player Development Committee for six years followed by a two year stint as the Vice Chair.

The Youth on Course pilot program is now up and running and a select group of youth are currently playing golf for just \$5 per round and we are on track for a full program launch in the spring of 2013.

In our competitive events series, our new registration engine provided unparalleled convenience for parents and players, resulting in a 65 percent increase in tournament registrations. These great increases meant we were able to host our biggest fields ever at many of our two-day events, some exceeding 240 players in a single day!

A century of memories for Bellingham Golf and Country Club

WHEN BELLINGHAM GOLF & COUNTRY CLUB HELD A WEEKEND OF SPECIAL events this past August to celebrate its centenary, it was actually 100 years, two months and three days old. Incorporated in June of 1912, Bellingham G&CC is, remarkably, one of only 33 businesses based in Washington State that officially began life that year and is still operating today.

The club owes much of its success and durability to its members' resilience and ingenuity. Like all clubs of a similar vintage, it had to survive the Great Depression and its aftermath which it did, barely, by creatively reworking the debt it had accumulated after steadily losing members during the 1930s and '40s, and then issuing \$200 shares that saw a significant shift in the membership's composition.

Having started out as a club of bankers and lawyers, it morphed into more of a blue-collar club fostering a mentality and work ethic that has endured to the present day, and which has created a club with an intimate small-town feel, a dedicated staff, and a membership that truly values the club's history as well as its place in the community.

For all its charitable endeavors (Bellingham G&CC actively supports the local YMCA, the Cancer Society and the Bellingham Food Bank, as well as allowing the Western Washington University men's and women's teams and high school teams to call the course home), and even after the addition of the swimming pool in 1961 and construction of a handsome new



clubhouse in 2005, the focus has always been on golf, so it was only natural the weekend celebration should start with a golf tournament.

"We had 90 participants, and started the day at 7:00am with a bagpiper out in the center of the course playing as competitors warmed up on the range," says the club's General Manager, Trent McAllister. "We played a 27-hole team event."

The morning, McAllister adds, was made particularly special not only by the piper but also the fact several copies of that morning's *Bellingham Herald* had arrived enabling participants to enjoy a fine history of the club written by sports editor David Rasbach as they registered and received their commemorative player kits.

On Saturday evening, 360 people attended a gala dinner in a tent erected on the ninth fairway. There were 26 past presidents honored, as were a litany of employees from the past and present, including current superintendent Dave Bocci, Bill Colwell who has worked in the maintenance department for 31 years, Bill Fulton who was superintendent from 1990-98 and who has been at the club a total of 32 years, and Sue Brown whose 39 years behind the clubhouse bar and in the office earned her the honor of having the bar named after her.

Four past club professionals – Rick Verbarendse, Steve Reuhl, Tom Parkhurst and Dean Russell – were also there and, given the part he played in ensuring the vitality of the club during the 1980s and '90s, Russell was called upon to act as emcee.

Russell presented long-time member Rick Weihe with a Lifetime Achievement Award for his 11 club championships, and numerous top performances in PNGA and WSGA events stretching back to 1970, the year Weihe won the WSGA Washington State Amateur Championship and was runner-up in the PNGA Pacific Northwest Amateur Championship (he also won the PNGA Men's Master-40 Amateur Championship in 1990, and the WSGA Senior Men's Amateur championship in 1998). This year, Weihe qualified for the USGA Senior Amateur. "Rick is an amazing golfer and gentleman," said Russell. "And it was a special moment for me to recognize his accomplishments and contributions to Bellingham Golf & Country Club."

Russell also introduced the Mayor of Bellingham, Kelli Linville, whose parents had been members and who took swimming lessons at the club as a child. She and current club president Don Van Andel exchanged plaques – one from the Governor's office to the club which now hangs outside the pro shop, and one from the club to the Mayor which hangs in City Hall.

After member Phil Multop toasted the club and its future, Seattle musician Vic Peters played music from the last 100 years, and the attendees danced into the small hours to the Rocky Vaselino band.

The following day, brunch was served in the clubhouse to 300 guests including members of the public. Thus concluded Bellingham Golf & Country Club's centenary weekend. The members had partied like it was 2012, celebrating the last 100 years and readying themselves for 100 more.

Popular Winter Series Returns for Fourth Season





EVERY GOLF COURSE HAS A HOLE LIKE THIS. And here, on this forested layout, you've been making your way just fine, minding your own business, chatting with your foursome. Maybe you got a hot dog and a soda at the turn.

But, really, you've been thinking about this hole for the past hour. To have any chance, you know you have to hit two of your best shots. Off the tee, swing away with all you have, but make sure you find the fairway. Think good thoughts. Remember what it feels like to be strong and true.

beyond a gaping ravine that angles long and away from you. And there is no give on this second shot. You're either on the green, or you're lost in the ravine.

Take the wind into account. Take your score into account. Take all past deeds and misdeeds into account. The green is large, and sloped so that it will accept long shots. Believe in this. Or, you can hail out to the left, short of the ravine, and chip on from there, hoping to save par with a one-putt.

A par is good here. Even a bogey is good. To play this hole well, is good.

For your second shot, you'll have a long downhill approach to a green that lies just
